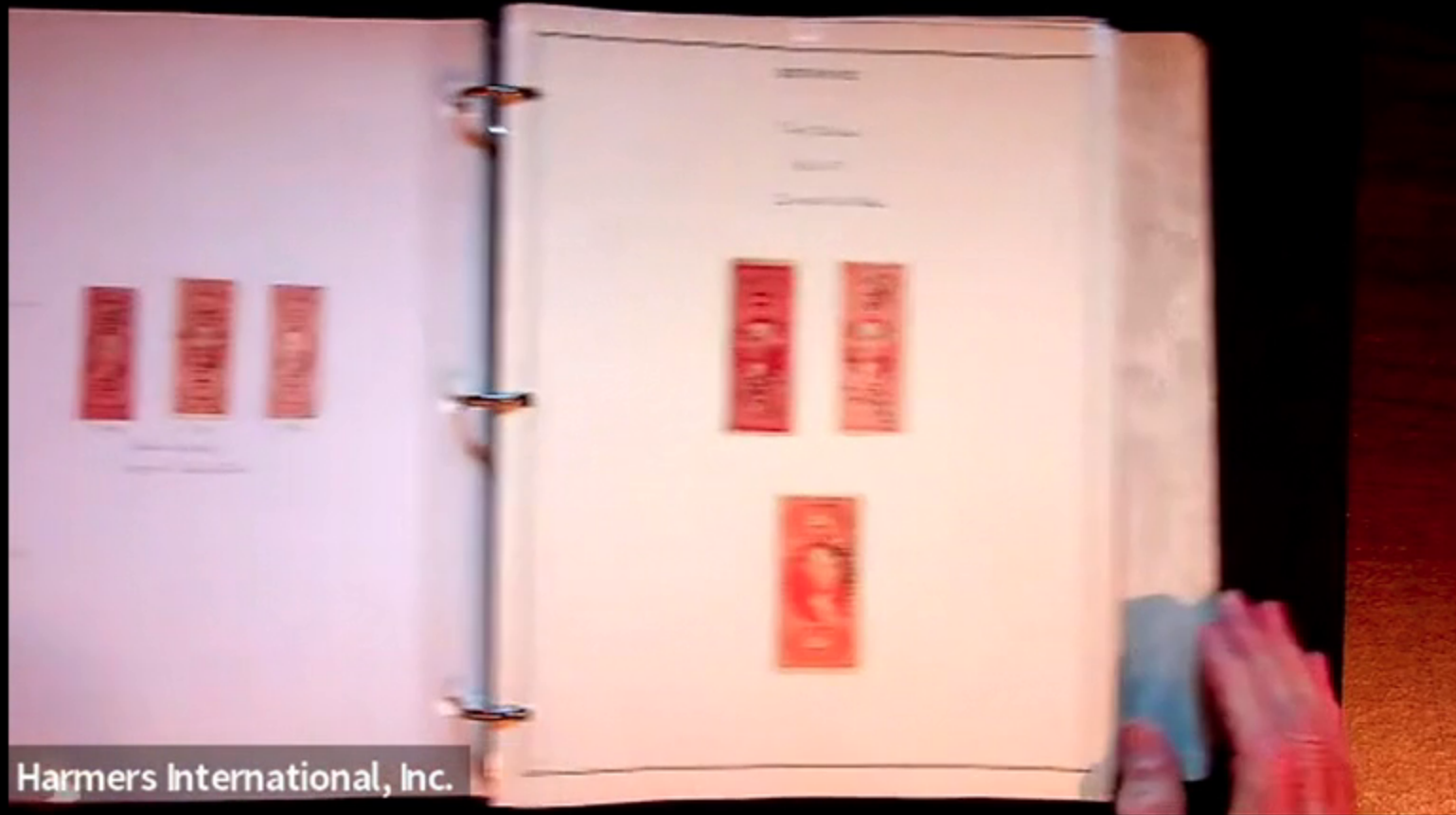



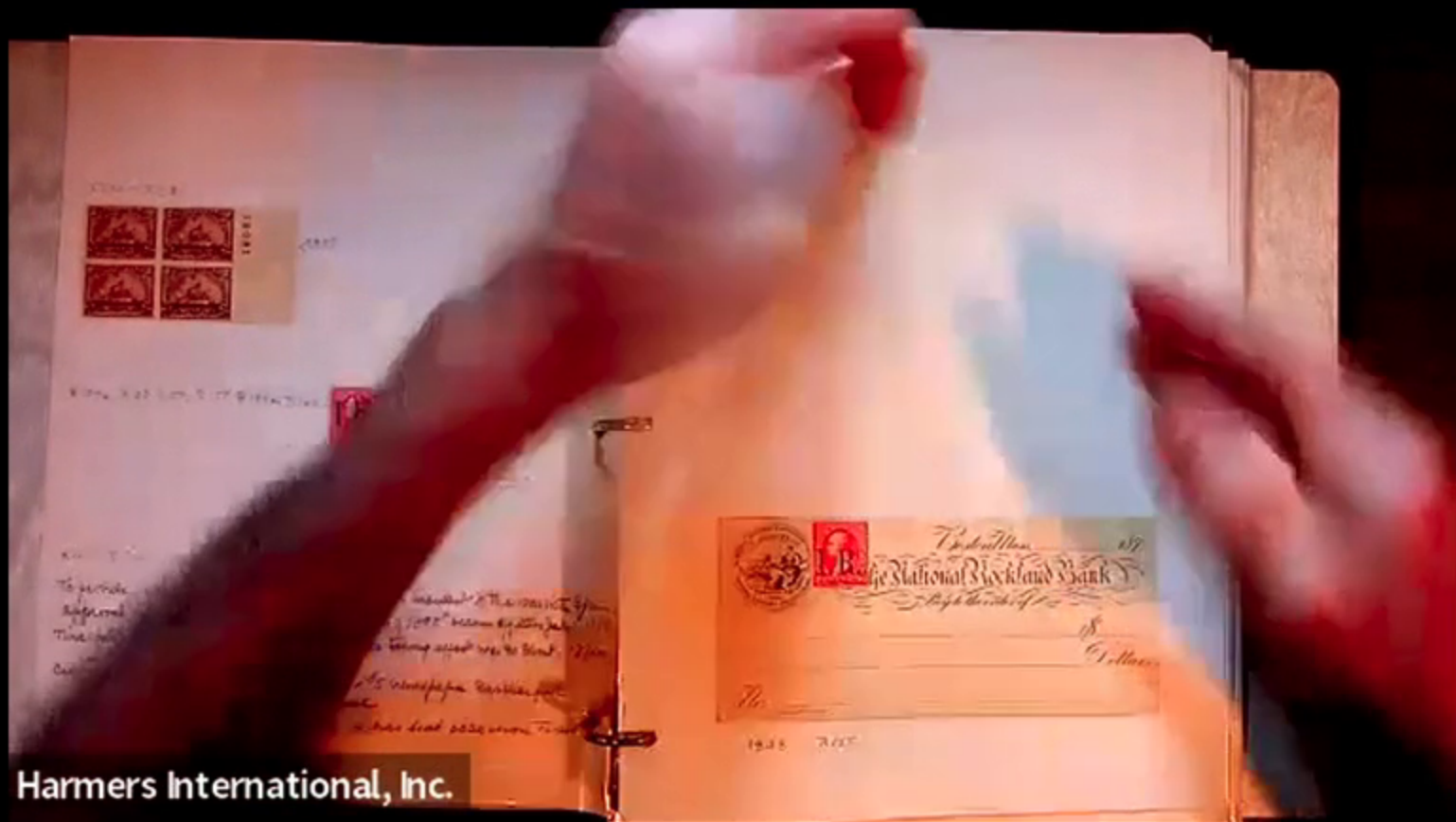

## REVENUE NOTES

By SEVERLY S. BROWN

### The Banknote Revenue

A REVIEW of our Revenue Notes that have the greatest value of the dollar today are those that comply with the 1906 Banknote Revenue Act (Lawrence), with the possible exception of the \$100 bank note. The 1906 Act was first passed March 31, 1906, and it gave us our first revenue note in history, which the public had never seen or even studied of this nature before. Some of these notes of this series are called "banknotes" and it is proposed to be the first or perhaps second to be changed to meet with some change in value.

A short time ago Mr. J. C. Brown, of Columbus, Ga., submitted a study of the 1906 Act to the Treasury. This is not the only one of the series, but Mr. Brown's study was of a note that has passed to the Treasury with the note of the 1906 Act. Some of the notes of this series, Mr. Brown suggested that they might be as well as if we had in it the note with a single note in our collection and so, I think, one of the most interesting studies of this series.

**Internal Revenue Service Marks  
Its 100th Anniversary Today**

*Agency Founded in 1864 For  
the Civil War Era in Part  
of Nation's Way of Life*

The Internal Revenue Service celebrates its 100th birthday today. The agency that collects the taxes that support the government has grown to a size that is almost unimaginable. It is now the largest of all government agencies, with a staff of more than 100,000 men and women.

Its jurisdiction extends to all forms of income, including the profits of corporations, the salaries of government employees, and the income of individuals. It also collects taxes on the sale of property, on the inheritance of property, and on the gift of property.

The agency's history is a story of growth and change. It was founded in 1864, during the Civil War, to collect taxes on the sale of property. At that time, the only form of property that was sold was land, and the only tax was a 3 percent tax on the sale of land.

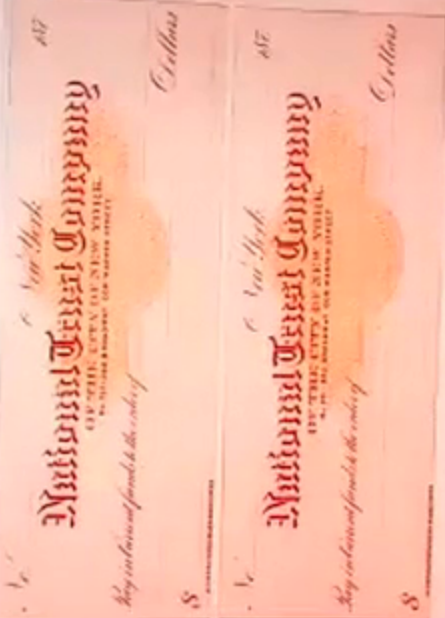

## A Check List of the Cigarette and Small Cigar Stamps of the United States

By Clifford W. Shaber, F. I. A. #11

**THE LAST** previous list of these stamps was published by Ed. Harpers in 1933, which list included all the classifications of the said stamps. Since that date, the number and varieties of these stamps has multiplied many times. The first original and up-to-date listing of any of these stamps was Dr. Vanderhorst's catalogue of best stamps which appeared in *The American Philatelist* about the year 1934.

This list is a radical departure from the 1933 list as the old and new stamps are listed separately. I am also mentioning the new stamps of cigarette stamps.

The material in this list has been drawn from the old catalogues from the several reports of the Bureau of Engraving & Printing from 1938 to 1941, from very reliable information included in Dr. A. W. Hall, Director of the Bureau, and from Kansas, Buffalo, Lexington, and Vanderhorst, who have very kindly sent me look and checked my specimens.

This list does not claim to be complete, for there are many specimens which make the job of a collector in each stamp. Specimens being more numerous of other stamp categories which are listed, so in most cases in the list some specimens have been left unlisted for specialists.

### Cigarette Stamps for Men that Have Passed the 1940 Censor

Before 1940 cigarettes were stamped by value as regular with temporary stamps. The first issue of 100 stamps was issued in 1940 and consisted of 20 packages of 10 cigarettes each.


